Unlike Volume 1, which proceeds step-by-step in a series of lessons, Volume 2 is organized in such a way that one can study individual chapters or use it as a reference for pronunciation problems as they arise. Individual frames cross-reference the kanji to alternate readings and to the frame in Volume 1 in which the meaning and writing of the kanji was first introduced.
